"I GOT HURT AT WORK, WHAT SHOULD I DO?"

- 1. Get medical attention.
- 2. Notify your supervisor in writing within 30 days of the accident and request a copy of the accident report. Identify witnesses.
- 3. Contact an attorney or file the appropriate forms with the New York State Workers' Compensation Board within two years from the date of the accident. Explore whether there are any third parties who may be potentially liable for your injuries.
- 4. Keep your medical current (every 45 days).
- 5. Attend all scheduled hearings.
- 6. Attend all Independent Medical Examinations.
- 7. Contact your attorney (if you have retained one) when you have any questions.
